# Staying Reliable as Temps Rise and **Demand for Electricity Surges**

Summer is here and with it comes the increased demand for electricity as air conditioners run overtime to keep homes and businesses cool. At Western Cooperative Electric, we work closely with our generation and transmission provider, Sunflower Electric Power Corporation, to ensure we're prepared for this seasonal demand — and that our system remains reliable no matter how high the temperature climbs.

Extreme heat puts strain on the entire electric grid, not just our local cooperative. That's why we coordinate with the Southwest Power Pool, our regional transmission operator, to monitor grid-wide conditions. In rare cases, during prolonged heatwaves, we may be asked to encourage members to reduce their usage or implement controlled outages to protect grid stability. Rest assured, we'll always keep you

informed if such measures become necessary.

You can help too. Adjusting your thermostat a few degrees, sealing air leaks, using major appliances during off-peak hours, and closing blinds in the afternoon all reduce the burden on the system. Even small changes

help ensure our community stays cool and powered.

Recent federal energy policies have threatened the reliability of the entire U.S. electric grid by pushing for the early retirement of dispatchable power plants — the kind that can be called on any time, day or night. # W.O.R.K Scholarship will Launch to **Support Local Professionals**

Western Cooperative Electric is proud to introduce the W.O.R.K. (Working Opportunities for Rural Kansas) Scholarship, a new program created to support individuals who have completed post-secondary education and are now building their lives within Western's service area.

The W.O.R.K. Scholarship offers \$1,000 in direct payment toward student loan debt or school-related financial obligations. This program is designed for those who have not only invested in their education but have also made a conscious decision to live, work and serve in our rural communities.

Applications open July 1 and will be accepted through Aug. 1, 2025. To qualify, applicants must:

- ▶ Be a current resident of Western Cooperative Electric's service area for at least six months.
- Have completed post-secondary education within the past five years.
- Show proof of employment or volunteer service within the community.

- Provide documentation of outstanding student loan debt or financial need.
- Include the company name, address and account number of where the payment should be directed.
- ► Submit a personal statement explaining their commitment to community life.

"This scholarship is about recognizing and supporting the people who make our rural communities stronger," said Christina Hayes, WCE Member Services Manager "The W.O.R.K. Scholarship allows us to give back to those who have chosen to plant roots and contribute to the future of our region."
